# **Thoughts for May**

This comment was made to me recently by someone who reads 'Around the Spire' each month but is not a regular churchgoer. It was part of a discussion about the .state of affairs in the tragedy of war in Ukraine.

Of course I could have replied to this person that she might have found it easier if she were to come to one of our church services! However, knowing this person quite well, this was not the sort of reply she would expect!

So YES – with this sort of event constantly before us, and now been going on for so long, it is very difficult to know how to answer the question.

So in a scenario like this, we are challenged, I believe, to try for ourselves just how we as individuals can feel that our prayers are the best we can offer! We may well feel, given that the situation in that part of the world seems to be going from bad to worse, that somehow our attempts to pray about it are of little worth.

# PRAY THROUGH ACTION!

# The Faith We Sing at Ascensiontide By Revd. Canon Michael Garland



Crown him with many crowns, the Lamb upon his throne; hark, how the heavenly anthem drowns all music but its own! Awake, my soul, and sing of him who died for thee, and hail him as thy matchless King through all eternity.

Ascension Day, invariably, falls in the month of May and this year we celebrate this important Feast Day on Thursday 26th May. It is a day when some cathedral and college chapel choirs ascend towers and sing special anthems. Ascensiontide hymns are majestic in their language and none more so than the hymn whose first verse is printed above – 'Crown him with many crowns.' It is a hymn which has seen many changes over the years, but credit is due to its original author, Matthew Bridges, who was born in Essex in 1800. He was brought up as an Anglican but was greatly influenced by the Oxford Movement which sought to reaffirm the catholic tradition of the Church. In 1848, Bridges entered the Roman Catholic Church and spent the latter part of his life in Canada. He died at Sidmouth in Devon in 1894.

Changes to the hymn were made later in the nineteenth- century when some hymn book editors felt that the original verses could no longer be used. What we have as a result is something of a hybrid. Matthew Bridges inspired the hymn initially, but a Canon of Wells Cathedral – Godfrey Thring, revised some of the original lines and added further lines of his own to give us the hymn in the form we have today. The verses are full of biblical imagery and contain strong and striking images. Verse two is a good example:

Crown him the Virgin's Son, the God incarnate born, whose arm those crimson trophies won which now his brow adorn: Fruit of the mystic Rose, as of that Rose the Stem; the Root whence mercy ever flows, the babe of Bethlehem.

The term, 'Mystic Rose' is a medieval title for the Virgin Mary, and it is combined with a reference to Isaiah ch11 v 1 where we read: 'A shoot shall come out from the stock of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots.'

The hymn's third verse reminds us that the Risen and Ascended Lord Jesus carries with him the marks of his Passion:

> Crown him the Lord of love; behold his hands and side, those wounds yet visible above in beauty glorified. no angel in the sky can fully bear that sight, but downward bends his burning eye at mysteries so bright.

The final verse is a great and fitting tribute to the loving work of redemption brought about by Jesus for the sake of us all. It is a triumphant shout for Ascensiontide Crown him the Lord of years, the Potentate of time, creator of the rolling spheres, ineffably sublime: all hail, Redeemer, hail! for thou hast died for me; thy praise shall never, never fail throughout eternity.

# "What is that called?" and "What is it for?" By Revd. Fr. Ian Robb



This month we focus on the worship we offer: To the glory of God, to deepen our own relationship with Him, to strengthen our fellowship with one another.

Our central act of worship is the <u>Eucharist</u> on Sundays. The word "eucharist" means "Thanksgiving" and takes us back to the Last Supper when Jesus instituted the rite by "giving thanks" over bread and wine with the reassurance that he would be with his Church for ever. "*Do this...*" "*Remember I am with you always*" - were two of his final commands to his friends.

The Eucharist is one of the seven sacraments of the Church and the one which we encounter most often. The Book of Common Prayer tells us that a Sacrament is "*An outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace given to us; a sign ordained by Christ himself, as a means whereby we receive him...*".

From its very beginning the Church has placed the Eucharist at the centre of its worshipping life; it is the time when the living Christ draws closest to us and we to him.

When we were made members of the Christian family, we submitted to the Sacrament of <u>**Baptism**</u> – a Sacrament which makes an abiding mark on us which can never be repeated. In baptism we are born again into the family of Christ, something which can happen only once. The same is true of <u>**Confirmation**</u>; when the bishop has laid hands on us and prayed the Holy Spirit into us, a life-changing moment has taken place. Likewise with the Sacrament of <u>**Ordination**</u>; those whom God calls to a particular ministry in His Church – that of Bishop, Priest, or Deacon – he then marks with his gift of the Spirit (again, through the laying-on of hands and the anointing with holy oil) that a lifetime change has taken place.

Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist are all familiar to us – these services take place in church regularly and we take an active part in them – either as a communicant at the Eucharist, a parent or grandparent, or godparent at a Baptism, or as a candidate or a sponsor at a Confirmation. Those of us who are ordained, or who have attended a service of ordination, can testify as to what a moving occasion that service is – as we watch friends or relatives dedicate their lives to Christ's service.

There are other Sacraments which may not always take place in church, or with a large group of people on attendance, but which are equally important. The Sacrament of <u>Marriage</u> bestows on husband and wife God's eternal blessing through his Holy Spirit and commits them to a new life together in the local community as well as within the family of God and strengthens them for all that lies ahead in their years together.

The inability of human beings to choose right from wrong often leads us into sin and the need to seek forgiveness, not only from each other, but also from God. Although all our worship contains prayers for forgiveness, sometimes they may not be enough for our own personal situation. In that case, we can request from our priest the Sacrament of <u>Penance</u> (sometimes called "Reconciliation"), where privately and confidentially we offer a particular sin or pattern of behaviour to God and receive His forgiveness. The priest who receives our confession is under obligation never to divulge what has been shared, but dimply to act as the means through which God's forgiveness – Absolution – is conveyed.

When illness strikes, or when death seems close, we need the reassurance of God's eternal love and presence. The Sacrament on <u>Unction</u> – the anointing with Holy Oil by a priest – is the sign of the promise of Jesus Christ that he is with us at all times; in life, in death, and beyond. It is one of the privileges of priestly ministry to be able to offer this Sacrament to anyone who asks, at any time.
