By having this lovely book of Remembrance we can now suggest to those who are bereaved, this opportunity of perpetuating their loved ones over the years to come.

You can see this book in a stand near the church door.

The names of loved ones are placed on the date of their passing by a calligrapher who is a member of our church, the pages turned to the appropriate date.

People often visit the church to see the book and may light a candle and say a prayer for the person they wish to remember.

If you wish to mark the date in this way, there are some forms on the table nearby – do please take one and if you wish to be a part of this, complete with care and return it as suggested.

There is a small charge for this to assist us in the work of upkeep of this lovely ancient church.



REMEMBERING.

Times & Seasons: Advent

<u>A new "Christian Year" begins on 1st December – Advent 1</u>

Advent is a season of expectation and preparation, as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming (*adventus*) of Christ in his incarnation, and also looks ahead to his final advent as judge at the end of time. The readings and liturgies not only direct us towards Christ's birth, they also challenge the modern reluctance to confront the theme of divine judgement:

> Every eye shall now behold him robed in dreadful majesty. (Charles Wesley)

The Four Last Things – Death, Judgement, Heaven and Hell – have been traditional themes for Advent meditation. The characteristic note of Advent is therefore expectation, rather than penitence, although the character of the season is easily coloured by an analogy with Lent. Rightly so, because both Advent and Lent are times of preparation – getting ready, in body and spirit, to celebrate a great historic event.

But Advent is more than just "getting ready for Christmas". Sadly, the anticipation of Christmas comes under increasing commercial pressure – especially from those who have forgotten (or have never heard) what the true meaning of the celebration is – and this has made it harder to sustain, during the four weeks of Advent, the appropriate sense of alert watchfulness, but the fundamental Advent prayer remains 'Maranatha' – 'Our Lord, come' (1 Corinthians 16.22).

You will see that during Advent Church decorations are simple and spare, and purple is the traditional liturgical colour. In the northern hemisphere,

the Advent season falls at the darkest time of the year, and the natural symbols of darkness and light are powerfully at work throughout Advent and Christmas. The lighting of candles on an Advent wreath was imported into Britain from northern Europe in the nineteenth century, and is now a common practice. On each of the four Sundays, one candle is lit: the first reminds us of the call of Abraham to be the founder of



the people of Israel; the second celebrates the work of all the prophets of the Old Testament and their message of the Messiah who is to come. shall conceive and bear a son, and she will call him Emmanuel" (which means "God with us").

There is much to celebrate and each week will have its own emphasis. St John wrote: "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." Join us on Advent Sunday when the first light is kindled and make your heart ready to greet him when he comes again.

The Third Sunday of Advent recalls the life of John the Baptist, the forerunner of the Messiah, and this Sunday was observed in medieval times as a splash of colour in the restrained atmosphere of Advent (*Gaudete* or 'Rose Sunday' - so the candle to be lit on this Sunday is pink), and the last days of Advent were marked by the sequence of Great 'O' Antiphons, which continue to inspire modern Advent hymns and meditations. You can read all the "Great 'O' antiphons in the hymn "O Come O Come Emmanuel". Traditionally each one of these is used individually during the last week of the season.

The Moravian custom of the Christingle – the word means "Christ light" - has similarly enjoyed great success in Britain since the latter part of the twentieth century, with the encouragement of the Children's Society; Christingle services can take place before or after Christmas. We shall be celebrating "Christingle" at St James on the 1st of December at 10.30am at our STJ's worship & praise, when the meaning behind the symbols of the orange, the ribbon, and the fruits, will be explained.



As I said earlier, Advent is more than just preparing to celebrate the first coming of the Christ in the birth of Jesus. The readings from the Old Testament which we shall be using will remind us of the years of longing for a saviour to come, and the promises given by God through his prophets, that the Messiah will indeed come to earth. The New Testament readings will focus our minds and prayers on the future – to that moment when the Christ will come again, just as he promised. The time when God will call an end to all the pain and sadness and we shall be gathered together as the Church in Paradise - just as we pray: "Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again".

Every Advent Sunday marks a year nearer to that time, so it is indeed time to get ready – not just by making sure that the house is ready for all the visitors and guests, but that our hearts and minds are ready to receive him when he comes in glory. It's a time to put away all those things which stop us being the people God intends us to be.

The season comes to a great climax with the news that the time has come; God is about to come among his people in human form. He has called a devout young woman to take a major part in his plan of salvation and the plan is about to come to fruition. Isaiah has already assured us: "A virgin
