And so, I am anxious to see that the contents of this magazine really do, as they say,

SCRATCH WHERE PEOPLE ITCH!

So here goes – the first of a series of questions which I, your Editor have received on this important aspect of our Faith.

WHEN SHOULD I PRAY?

I feel that this does depend on many factors, depending on the life style of the individual.

There are many who could easily have a prayer life which is practised several or indeed many times a day; there are others for whom this would not be possible.

Your clergy, for example, undertake to say what is called THE DAILY OFFICE – a service of prayer and praise – MORNING & EVENING PRAYER which used to be called Matins and Evensong, with prayer and intercession built into it.

This framework is part of the life of our Cathedrals (including our own), Abbeys and religious communities, and it would be good to join in one of these when time permits.

WHAT ABOUT YOU?

It may not be the right way for you, and something far less structured would be the right approach. There are many little books which can help you with this – ask me for details if you wish.

SO IN CONCLUSION...

Do find out what is right for you as a person and approach your own pattern of Prayer in a positive way.

It will then indeed be 'THE HEARTBEAT OF YOUR CHRISTIAN LIFE'

Our new venture Jamie's Ark will be launched this month in the Kingsway Community Centre on Thursday 14th March from 1.30pm -2.30pm. It is free and we hope that as many parents their babies and preschool children as possible will attend.

This month we begin the season of Lent. This runs from Ash Wednesday 6th March to Easter Day, Sunday 21st April. Our service on Ash Wednesday takes place at 10.00am with Holy Communion. If you visit the church during this period don't be surprised to see purple drapes over the crosses and flowers removed. It is a sombre period, a time of reflection. Many people give up their favourite foods during this period others take on new challenges. As we do so, we remember the sacrifice that Jesus made for us as he died on the cross during Good Friday. 

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"Times and Seasons": Saints in March

1st: David, Patron Saint of Wales - David (or Dewi) was a monk in the sixth century. He lived an exemplary life of asceticism and spirituality, and was known as kind and compassionate to others, especially the poor and the sick. He founded a monastery at Menevia (now St David's) and at least a dozen other monasteries. He based his "Rule" on the Egyptian desert monks, with a strong emphasis on hard work, abstinence from alcohol, and refraining from unnecessary speech. He died in 601 and was made the patron Saint of Wales in the 12th century.

2nd: Chad, Bishop of Lichfield - Chad was born in Northumberland, the youngest of four sons, all of whom became monks or priests. They entered the monastery on the isle of Lindisfarne, and Chad eventually became Abbot. During the confusion in Church discipline between the Celticorientated, Anglo-Saxon hierarchy and the pressure from Rome for conformity, Chad became Bishop of York for the first time. To preserve harmony he stepped aside on the arrival of Theodore in Britain, and eventually became Bishop of Mercia, a huge diocese whose centre became Lichfield. Chad travelled extensively around his diocese and was muchloved for his wisdom and diplomacy. The plague was prevalent at this time and Chad fell victim and died on this day in 672.

7th: Perpetua, Felicity, & their Companions - Vibia Perpetua was a married noblewoman of Carthage (Tunisia) and Felicity was her personal servant. Saturas was their parish priest and he was attended by Saturninus and Revocatus. The ladies were being prepared for baptism when they were all arrested by the Roman authorities and sentenced to be executed in the public arena by wild animals. In prison, they received the sacrament of Baptism and before their execution they made a public confession of their faith in front of the assembled crowds. The account of their martyrdom was circulated around the Christian communities in North Africa, giving encouragement to their Christian brothers and sisters in the face of adversity. They died on this day in the year 203.

8th: Edward King, Bishop of Lincoln - Edward was born in London in 1829 and after ordination became chaplain and then principal of Cuddesdon Theological College outside Oxford. Then followed twelve years as professor of Theology in Oxford when he influenced a generation of men in

training for the priesthood. In 1885 he was consecrated Bishop of Lincoln, a position he held until his death. His advocacy of Catholic principles in ritual as well as theology involved him in controversy, but his significant gift to the Church was his example as a pastoral and caring bishop to both clergy and laity.

17th: Patrick, Patron Saint of Ireland - Patrick was born in Cornwall in the year 390 and aged sixteen was captured by Irish raiders and taken to Ireland. After six years he escaped to France, where his nominal Christian faith grew and matured. He trained for the priesthood and served under Martin of Tours. In his forties he returned to Ireland as a bishop, making his base at Armagh. He walked all around the island, gently bringing people to a knowledge of Christ. Despite several attempted persecutions, he established a number of monastic communities, which became the infrastructure required to maintain the faith after his death – on this day, in 460.

18th: Cyril, Bishop of Jerusalem - Cyril was born in Caesarea and became Bishop of Jerusalem in 349. He nurtured the resident Christian population and also the many pilgrims who came to the city from all over Christendom, seeking out the "holy places" connected with Jesus. Cyril taught the faith in line with the principles of Nicea, and his formal lectures were well-received by those who came seeking baptism. His innovations for the observance of Holy Week and Easter are the foundation of how we celebrate that important time today. Cyril died in 386.

19th Joseph of Nazareth - Luke's gospel describes how Joseph, a good man, the carpenter from Nazareth, took the new-born Jesus as if he were his own, thus establishing Jesus in the descent of David, to accord with the prophecy that Israel's deliverer would of the house and lineage of David.

25th: The Annunciation of our Lord to the Blessed Virgin Mary - This very special day marks the conception of the Christ-child in the womb of Mary, and has been celebrated in the Church since the 4th century. The perfect humanity and the complete divinity of Jesus is affirmed, leading to the affirmation of Mary as "Theotokos" - the God-Bearer, which in the West became translated as Mother of God. For her faith, her trust, and her devotion, Mary rightly has a unique place of honour and veneration.
