## ***Editorial***

### **'I DON'T HAVE THE TIME!'**

I wonder how many times, like me, you who are reading this article, have said just that? But of course it is just not true is it? We all have the same amount of time at our disposal, as the hours and minutes of each day tick away!



O.K. - of course it is true that in total the length of our earthly lives will differ from person to person, and we all know of people whose span of years is tragically cut short. But what I am seeking to share with you as your editor is to encourage you to approach the time we have at our disposal in the 'here and now' in the best possible way – and what follows is a way to do just that.

In 1954 a French priest, Michel Quoist compiled a book of prayers called 'Prayers of Life' which quickly became a best-seller through its earthly appeal to apply prayer in all sorts of times and occasions. It was translated into many languages and said so much to many people who soon discovered that his novel approach to prayer helped to transform their life conversing with God.

I am one of those people, and in particular his prayer 'Lord I have time' rang many bells with me, and I well recall that I was introduced to this book and way of praying in the autumn when I had just started my training for the priesthood at Durham. Our college chaplain, the Archdeacon of Auckland read this poem on time in the dramatic way which the author intended. I would love to have opportunity of relating this prayer to you as our chaplain did – I know I could not do it as well as he did, but I would love to have a go sometime. Suffice it for the present to quote Father Michel's introduction in the book, for this particular prayer, "People complain that they haven't enough time. It's because they look at their lives from too human a point of view. There's always time to do what God wants us to do, but we must put ourselves completely into each moment that he offers us."

So good luck dear Reader in your adventure into prayer! May it be a real step forward as you seek to be one of the disciples of our present age



I’m a wife, mother and grandmother and I grew up in north Bristol where I was involved in my local church, Holy Trinity, Westbury-on-Trym, from a very early age where my faith was nourished and nurtured over the years. Before marriage I worked as a legal secretary and later went into teaching, both in Bristol and Gloucester. I’ve been a Headteacher of 2 Primary Schools, worked as a Special Educational Needs & Disability Officer for South Gloucestershire LA and before I retired, I ran the Primary Pupil Referral Unit for children with social, emotional and behavioural difficulties. This enabled me to fit in work alongside part-time ordination training at WEMTC with the necessary residential training commitment.



I’ve been a Governor of two Community Schools and was Chair of Governors at a church school for many years and I’m currently a member of the Diocesan Board of Education.

I was ordained by Bishop Michael 15 years ago as a Self-Supporting Priest and was originally licensed to my home Benefice of Slimbridge in 2003.

Since retiring from my secular employment I’ve been Priest in Charge of a Benefice of 5 churches in the south of the Diocese for 6 years before moving to Matson as a part-time Associate Priest.

For relaxation, I enjoy spending time with my family, cooking, gardening, reading and sewing.

## **"Times and Seasons": The Christian Year**

**"Ordinary Time"** - Or, if you grew up using the Book of Common Prayer, you may still refer to "Sundays after Trinity". I remember a priest who often referred to this particular season as "The long green afternoon of the Church" - long, because it takes up almost half of the year; green, because that is the colour of the vestments we use; and afternoon because it follows on from all the major events of the year before we begin the round again!

You know of course that we condense all the events of Our Lord's earthly life and ministry into less than twelve calendar months; we reach a climax at Easter, when we celebrate his victory over death, and his sending of the Holy Spirit to the Infant Church on the feast of Pentecost. After this, our Sunday readings tend to concentrate on the things Jesus said and did, and how the first Christians set about carrying on his work and sharing his message.

The Sunday immediately after Pentecost is known as "Trinity Sunday" when we celebrate, not an event as such, but one of the principal tenets of the Christian faith – that the God we worship is revealed in three particular ways, which we refer to as Father (the Creator), the Son (the Redeemer), and the Holy Spirit (the Sanctifier – the one who makes us holy). No other world religion speaks of God in this way: the Father who created the universe, the Son who came to redeem and save that creation, and the Holy Spirit who came to give life to the people of God.

It is therefore right that we mark this belief with a special celebration.

The Sundays which follow are "ordinary" in that they are not particular "festivals" - although every Sunday (the first day of the week) is an anniversary of the Resurrection of Jesus. That is why Sunday is the principal "holy day" for Christians, the day when we make worship, and especially the eucharist, a priority. (I was once in a church where the priest insisted that on every Sunday throughout the year one of the hymns was an "Easter" hymn; I leave it to you to decide if that was a good idea!)

Green is the liturgical colour of the season because it is the natural colour of the created world around us. Scientists tell us that "green" is the result of sunlight reacting with the chemical chlorophyll; gardeners know that plants deprived of daylight soon lose their greenness no matter how much we feed and water them. We could easily describe "green" not as Fr Hugh's favourite colour but as God's own colour, because He makes it!

Of course, the weeks of Ordinary Time do not continue un-interrupted. There are other festivals to be observed, such as our own Patronal Festival when we celebrate the lives of St James and St Mary Magdalene, and give thanks for those who established and built the church in this parish all those years ago. This year our Patronal falls on July 29<sup>th</sup> and we hope that everyone will be in church to celebrate the day and also to re-dedicate themselves as members of the Body of Christ on Earth – the Church of God.

An important day which occurs soon after Trinity Sunday is the day often referred to as “Corpus Christi”, a Latin term meaning the Body of Christ. It is a day set aside for a special thanksgiving for the gift of Holy Communion, the sacrament which Jesus himself gave to the Church, and through which He continues to do so today. The Eucharist is such a special gift that it is right to take time to remember how it began, and to give thanks that we are all continually invited to take part and so receive God's grace, given through the physical forms of bread and wine.



“Do this in remembrance of me; remember I am with you always.” We celebrate “Corpus Christi” on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday, and there will be a celebration of the Eucharist in St James at 7.30pm.

We may call it “Ordinary Time”, but there is really nothing ordinary about being a Christian. The New Testament is full of evidence of how people's lives were changed by their acceptance of the teachings and way of life given and demonstrated by Jesus. Down the centuries that has continued to be true; men and women all round the world have found their lives transformed by surrendering to Christ. Over and over again He takes what we call “ordinary” and makes it “special” through His grace, and so we find Heaven in Ordinary.

“Teach me, my God and King, in all things thee to see...” (George Herbert “Hymns Old & New 629”)
