#### "Thought for the Week" : Fr. Michael

The Second Sunday of Easter

Today's gospel reading is in two parts. There is an Easter Day scene where Jesus appears to his disciples in the evening; greets them with the blessing of peace and reveals the marks of his passion and death. Then the story moves on a week to tell us of the reaction of Thomas on meeting the Risen Lord for the first time. Thomas was not present on the earlier occasion and was not convinced by his friends that Jesus had been raised. In other words, he doubted their story. Ever since, Thomas has been referred to as Doubting Thomas. But we shouldn't think any less of him for that. In fact, Thomas is really our friend. He voices what we all experience from time to time. Doubt is not a sin! We may recall the cry of a father who brought his mute son to Jesus for healing in response to the comment that everything is possible to the one who believes - 'Lord, I believe; help my unbelief!' On many occasions, we may give voice to that prayerful request.

With his honestly spoken doubt, Thomas stands not at the edges but at the very heart of the company of God's faithful people. Tradition has it that he took the Christian gospel to India where to this day the Mar Thoma church in the state of Kerala honours a true friend of Jesus. This was a major outcome of his discipleship.

In his Diary of Faith and Doubt, Bishop Mark Green offers these helpful thoughts: "Whether we open the pages of the gospels in confidence or in doubt, the Lord who faces us in them will show us who we are, what we are for, and who he is. He will show us how to live, how to trust and how to obey."

We know how Thomas came to be blessed in the scene recorded in today's gospel. We too can rejoice in the blessing of the Risen Christ in this Easter season, when resurrection faith and resurrection hope is made more meaningful through our moments of struggle and honest doubt.
