## **"Thought for the Week": Fr. Gordon**

The Fifth Sunday of Easter

### **Phillip and the Ethiopian**

At his Ascension, Jesus had said that his followers would be his witnesses in Jerusalem, all Judea and Samaria and to the ends of the earth. We don't hear much of the disciples after the resurrection but we do know they all bore the fruit of being with Jesus. Philip went to Samaria and told the story of Jesus there and as he made to leave Samaria, he met a man who might signal this dynamic movement of the gospel.

In those days, the Kingdom of Ethiopia or Nubia was found on the Nile, south of the first cataract at Aswan. The Ethiopian Queen Mother's high - ranking court official had oversight of the riches of a vast royal treasury.

He was a God-fearer, he had been to Jerusalem to worship Israel's God and, as a eunuch, and he wouldn't have been allowed to celebrate the festival. Physically unfit and ritually excluded; He'd travelled all that way and didn't have an entrance ticket when he arrived. All he could do was pray at a distance.

And yet the Lord God still so captivated him that he's reading Isaiah on the way home. Philip was invited to his chariot and they looked at the words. Philip simply asked if he understood what he was reading. The Ethiopian replied how could he understand without a guide?

Philip talked of Jesus, of the crucifixion and resurrection and suddenly the Ethiopian's physical, social and cultic exclusion is overturned. He is embraced by the God who is revealed in the crucified Jesus, and he's welcomed gladly by Phillip and was so moved that he wanted to be baptised in the nearby water. He then goes on his way rejoicing.

So, a new branch is added to the vine. The vine was a symbol of Israel, pruned and kept pure by the God-given cult and its symbolic world.

The crucified and risen Jesus is the true vine, and new symbols – the empty cross, the empty tomb - speak of dealing with sin and death once and for all, and a free welcome of overflowing love for all who hear and receive it.

After being baptised the Ethiopian went on his way rejoicing as a new branch of the vine, with new life, new responsibilities, and new power. Tradition has it that the Ethiopian went home and started to evangelise Ethiopia, he bore fruit that lasts to this day.
