

Ministry takes me far and wide and sometimes home in a sense. I am a priest who also has a vocation as scientist and once a year I join the Society of Ordained Scientists for our annual retreat.

It is amazing to be with sometimes 100 others who share this joint vocation. This year I took a special gift from our town and region because I was asked to commission an altar cross for the Society.



The Society Cross was designed some time ago and consists of a cross constructed from an I-bar of structural steel interwoven with the DNA double helix. It resembles a Celtic Cross and represents the interwoven presence of God among us, which is a shared sense of Christian spirituality for many scientists of faith.

I asked Gloucester Men Shed to cut out the shape of the cross and then commissioned a scenic artist from Stroud called Bryan-Merrett. The cross was then commissioned by Bishop David, Bishop of Manchester who is the pastoral visitor for the Society at our meeting. It was a project that all involved have enjoyed and found new spiritual riches in and I hope you can see from the attached photos how well received the cross was.







The annual Ride and Stride this year is scheduled for 13 September. It is a special day out cycling around the local countryside calling at churches within the area. Whilst the route is around 20 miles and takes in a few bumps, it is not too arduous but encourages young and mature riders to participate in a fun parish day out on relatively safe minor roads. However, the main purpose of this reminder, is to ensure both you and your bike are in good condition for the ride.

That said, we must not forget that the main aim is to sponsor riders to support our church buildings and save our historic heritage.

"Times and Seasons" - the Christian Year A look at the various seasons of the Church Calendar: the month of July brings us to the season of "Ordinary Time"

When the Church celebrates Trinity Sunday, we find ourselves half-way through the Christian Year. All the major feasts and fasts have been kept and all the written events in the earthly life of our Lord have been remembered. We mark this half-way point by celebrating the unique Christian belief in God the Holy Trinity – God's revelation of himself to us as Father – the Creator; as Son – the Redeemer, and Holy Spirit – the Sanctifier. All together this means: God made us in the beginning; through sharing in our human life as Jesus Christ he rescues us from sin and death; and coming to us as Holy Spirit – as God we cannot see but can certainly feel – he confirms us as his children.



From Trinity Sunday onwards, we enter the weeks we call "Ordinary Time", during which we shall in our readings in church all that Jesus said and did during his earthly ministry. This year, the gospel-readings will be primarily from St Luke so that by the end of the Church year, we shall have heard almost all of St Luke's account. This will be accompanied by readings from St Paul's letters to young churches in which Paul sets out his thoughts on Christian living.

As "Ordinary Time" unfolds, we will also be prompted to think seriously about the wonders of creation all around us – the very colour of the church vestments will be green, the colour of nature which is created by the action of the sun on plant life. The Church is the first ever Green party! The actions of the Creator can make us ponder on the wonder and beauty all around us: the ancient rocks beneath our feet, the power of the ocean around our islands, the animals, birds, insects, and reptiles which share this earthly home with us.

We will rejoice in the skill of farmers and growers in producing food for our use, and give thanks for the scientists who teach us to care for the very environment which sustains our life. A priest-colleague some years ago once referred to the weeks after Trinity as "The long, green, afternoon of the Church" - a lovely description of this time of year, especially when we admit that summer afternoons are ideal for spending time in stillness and in thanksgiving to God for all his goodness to us in and through Creation. But then move on and make a plan, a rule of life, for you and your household. How best can you play your part in helping to care for God's creation? Your home and garden, the natural resources you use / recycle? Creation is God's gift to us; like all gifts it should be treasured and the giver remembered with love and respect. What is our gift to Him?

During the first weeks of "Ordinary Time" there will of course be days when we can celebrate some of the many lights who have shone in the Church in their own generation:

3 rd July: Thomas the Apostle, who rejoiced at the sight of his living Lord and who later travelled many miles in the service of the Gospel. Thomas is credited with being the founder of the Christian Church in India.

11th July: Benedict, the Abbot of Monte Casino. His "Rule of Life" is still used, not only by monks and nuns, but by millions of Christians around the world.

14th July: John Keble, priest & poet, born at Fairford. He was committed to the importance of full-time parish ministry and Christian teaching.

22nd July: Mary Magdalene. St Luke tells us that Jesus cured her of what we nowadays would call a mental illness. In gratitude, she followed Jesus and was one of a group of women who provided resources for the disciples. She was rewarded with the first view of the risen Christ.

25th July: James, brother of John, a fisherman from Galilee, and one of the first disciples to be called by Jesus. Now known as James the Great, and patron of our church.

29th July: Martha, Mary, & Lazarus. Friends of Jesus from Bethany; Jesus and the twelve were regular visitors to their home. Lazarus was restored to life by Jesus and Mary anointed Jesus feet before his final visit to Jerusalem.

So there is a lot to think about, to pray and give thanks for during "Ordinary" days in an extraordinary Creation

From the Editor's desk

Regular readers of 'Around the Spire' will be aware that I have been mentioning some of the basics on which the work and witness of the Church is built - the first and second are FAITH AND FUN.

So now to the third, in many ways the most challenging — **FINANCE**.

"MONEY MAKES THE WORLD GO ROUND" or so they say!

It is of course true that it is very much a part of all our lives in one way or another. In the life of the Church this is very much the case!

So here at St James Quedgeley those responsible have the task of ensuring they are able to balance the books, so the money coming in covers the considerable financial obligations we have.

The major of these, is the upkeep in so many ways of our beautiful church building, much of which stretches back over the centuries. It has been and still does offer so much to the people of the area in all sorts of ways and we are responsible for ensuring that this is maintained for those who follow on from us. This is very much the home and source of maintaining the Christian Faith which I referred to in the first of this series of Foundations. So how can we ensure that we have the necessary resources to enable this, whilst insuring the Church maintains and offers a way of life that so many people seek?

Straight away I must state - **No one is charged to come to Church** - either for the acts of worship we offer or at other times when the Church is available for people to meet, be still, quiet, light a candle in prayer. So, St James' is almost always open during the day, and so many do come for so many reasons.

So how do we find the funds for all this, whilst we also have other obligations too, to the Church in Gloucester Diocese and else where.

The answer lies mainly in the hands of the people who are regular members of the Church here and other friends too.

The main part of this is what is called Christian Stewardship or Planned Giving. Here the individual or family make a pledge to support the Church by their available way of life and income. Additional ways of attracting funds is a wide variety of events of all kinds to attract support.

This is where the second element of Foundations come in FUN! We do here at St James have a great appetite to enjoy ourselves and very often our events which often take a lot of work are also a laugh a minute for everyone.

The recent Spring Fair which was a great joy. By the time you read this we will have had a visit from Bishop Robert which will surely have been a wonderful occasion - see items on this in 'Around the Spire'

News from our schools



Year 2 attended the DGAT leavers service at Gloucester Cathedral. In a series of articles, members of the Prayer Cell group explore how their five senses help them formulate their prayers. This month, although not one of the 'five senses' Tony explores speech and its impact on prayer and everyday life.

Five Senses

Speech is not one of the five senses, however speech plays a big part in our everyday lives including our prayers.

I went to school at Christ Church St Leonards on sea in Sussex, where I was confirmed at 16 years of age. This allowed me to take Holy Communion on Sunday but on the Saturday we had to attend confession. This is where I would confess my Sins, sharing the burden through the power of speech. Though at my age, I could be gone a long time and I might not wish to confess all, so I simply said, 'and all the sins I can't remember'... though somehow ended up with six or more Hail Mary's for penance.



When I pray at night, sometimes I like to read the prayer out loud, listening back on myself, resonating the words and the meaning behind them. The Lord's Prayer asks us much but tells us so much more, for example;

'Forgive us our sins, As we forgive those who sin against us'


The first line is about asking for forgiveness, communicating our sins and holding ourselves accountable. The second line is about forgiving others and can be hard, challenging us not only to talk but to listen.

Speech is more than just talking through, it is an expression of ones self through sounds, gestures and expression of emotions. Like when I talk to my wife, she says 'you say one thing but your face says another'.

How do I pray?

I use the Church House Publishing called 'Time to Pray' via a book and app on my phone. This allows me not only to read but also listen to day and evening prayers wherever I am.

Open the Book (OtB) is an exciting storytelling project where Bible stories are shared with children in a way that is fun, interactive and memorable. As invited guests in school, storytelling teams use the Open the Book programme to prepare and present a 10–15-minute scripted Bible story to a school assembly, involving the children as much as possible.





On the 19th May we held our Annual Parish Assembly and the Annual Council meeting and we would like to thank those local residents who came along to the Assembly with their various concerns which were taken forward by the council and are being addressed.

The Annual Council meeting is when the new Chair and Vice Chair are voted in for the forthcoming year and councillors have an opportunity to state which committees they would like to join. This year sees Cllr Steve Wilcox as Chair once again and Cllr Julian Powell as Vice Chair after both being unanimously voted in. They make a great team and the other councillors agreed that they both deserve to remain in post.



To add to the excitement, 3 new councillors have now joined the council, Cllr Daniel Hobbs who was co-opted to the Severn Vale Ward, Cllr Steph Carter who was co-opted to the Fieldcourt Ward and Cllr Rachel Jennings who was co-opted to the Kingsway Ward. All three come with fresh enthusiasm and a desire to make a difference within their community and we welcome them to our happy team. The council over the last 12 months have welcomed various new local residents onto the council, promoting a really positive and proactive 'vibe'. As well as this, the Town Councillors, City and County Councillors for

Quedgeley are working cohesively purely for the benefit of our local community. Our notice board in Tesco has been refreshed to cater for this joined up approach and so that you can see at a glance who your Town Councillors, City Councillors and County Councillors are. You can also meet your local councillors at Tesco once a month.

It is fair to say that traffic is the current hot topic with many many people concerned about the A38 slip road closure and the impact this is having on the immediate area. We try to answer as many questions that we can, however these are works agreed by County Highways and we are only informed of any works due to be carried out. We can however try to support our local residents by fact finding and providing up to date contacts for those concerns to be directed to and we advise anyone who wishes to find out more information or who may have an individual question to email Highways on highwaylegalagreements@glouestershire.gov.uk.

Vandalism continues to play a huge part unfortunately in our community with Kingsway Sports Pavilion targeted in particular. It's always so frustrating when these things happen, especially when the perpetrators are normally from within the community. We once again ask people to keep a keen eye out and if you see anything that you feel is unacceptable, report it to the Police immediately.

All you need to do is contact the office on 01452 721552 and make an appointment. The window for inspection is open from Monday 2nd June until Friday 11th July.

Events: Our next event is a long way off, our annual Fireworks Event which will be held this year on Saturday 8th November. Plans are already in place for this. Our new councillors however are keen to consider a Summer fiesta so watch this space....

Agreement is in place for picnic benches to be installed at Bristol Road Rec which will enable familes to enjoy some quality time there whilst children play in the play park area. We hope these will be enjoyed by all.

As you can see we have a very hard working council with all of the councillors split into committees and bringing forward their own skills and experience and in the Autumn the councillors have agreed to hold a Future Group seminar to take time out and really identify what they can do further for the community. This is always a really beneficial event because it brings the councillors and staff together with one thing in mind, Quedgeley and Kingsway.
