TO RESPOND TO HUMAN NEED BY LOVING SERVICE

If you read my Editorial in the July/August edition of 'Around the Spire' you may recall that I introduced the FIVE MARKS FOR MISSION - WAYS TO TAKE THE GOSPEL FORWARD IN OUR PRESENT AGE.

This is one of those marks and relates very closely to the story from my own parish ministry. in the parish of All Saints in Hereford City.

I can do no better in order to illustrate this Response to Human Need from an illustration of that ministry as it was at that time - the late 1970's.

Adjacent almost to All Saints was the local cattle market - a large area of open pens where cattle and sheep were housed for auction. Each night a very different form of life took over - men, women and even youngsters who were homeless, used straw in the pens to bed down for the night whatever the weather.

Our parishioners were appalled at the situation of these people and together we decided that we could not turn a blind eye!

Hence the appointment of the Lay Worker who brought his own expertise into this situation and with a band of willing church members set up a night shelter in the back of the church to provide some warmth and soup and hot drinks. This went on for some years until a more suitable organisation took over.

So I use this experience to illustrate just what I believe is meant by that phrase - to **RESPOND TO HUMAN NEED.**

HOW DO WE RESPOND TO THIS HUMAN NEED IN THE HERE AND NOW?

Clearly the need is very much still here in our midst! We do not have to look far to see examples of **HUMAN NEED** around us.

How do we respond? Do we?

Let's be honest - unless you are far better than me, you too will have done just that! Of course, you may say, the little response I can make will not help much - and by itself you would be quite right! But a corporate, team effort with each giving a little **WILL** make a difference going where it is really needed.

Jesus' Jester

The Venerable David Sutch TD

Having just moved here, I was sorting through my papers and found my grandfather's (The Venerable Ronald Sutch, Vicar of Cirencester and Archdeacon of Cheltenham -AT THE SAME TIME!)-book of Religious Jokes and this was on a piece of paper within the book

The Bishop of Ripon told this story: "A not very wise bishop asked the girls of one school what a mitre, a pastoral staff and a pectoral cross were. None could answer. The headmistress telephoned to her opposite number at another school, which the bishop was to visit the next day, to warn her. The bishop's suspicions were roused by the unanimous response to his first two questions. So he changed the third, and asked 'What is an Archdeacon?' The girls answered with one voice: 'A cross that the bishop has to carry round his neck.'"

A series celebrating, month by month, some of those who left a special mark on the history of the worldwide Christian Church. "Lights" that shine in September by Fr. lan Robb



2nd: The Martyrs of Papua New Guinea: During the second world war, two English priests, seven Australian priests and two Papuan evangelists remained with their congregations following the invasion of the island, during which the Christian community was persecuted. They were betrayed and beheaded and are now collectively known as the New Guinea Martyrs.

3rd: Gregory the Great. Elected pope in 590, Gregory initiated the mission to England, sending Augustine and forty monks to re-establish the church here. He was well-known as a teacher of the faith and a dedicated pastor to his flock.

8th: The Birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This festival in honour of the mother of our Lord is celebrated on this day in both the Eastern and Western Churches, and the part she played in the great plan of salvation.

14th: Holy Cross Day. Helena, the Christian mother of the emperor Constantine, whilst on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, observed the discovery of a wooden cross which many believed to be the cross of Christ. As a result of her testimony, Constantine adopted the sign of the cross as the official Roman emblem and contributed towards the building of a basilica on the site of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem.

17th: Hildegard of Bingen. She became a nun at the age of eighteen in the abbey of Bockelheim. She wrote extensively about her visions of the light of Christ and established a new abbey at Bingen, from where she and her fellow nuns travelled out into the Rhineland, teaching and ministering to the sick. She died in 1179.

21st: Matthew, Apostle & Evangelist The tax-collector who Jesus called to be a disciple. Much despised because of his occupation, Matthew affirmed that his life would change because of his call. The gospel which bears his name is testament to his commitment to Christ.

25th: Lancelot Andrewes, Bishop of Winchester. In addition to his ministry as a bishop he was also a translator of much of the Old Testament of what is now known as the "Authorised (or King James) Version". He died on this day in 1626 and was buried in a church which was then in his diocese but which is now Southwark cathedral.

29th: Michael & All Angels. Michael, Gabriel, & Raphael are the three named Biblical angels, depicted as the beloved messengers of God. Michael is known as the slayer of the dragon in the book of Revelation and is regarded as the protector of Christians from the devil. Gabriel was charged with the task of announcing God's plan of salvation to the Virgin Mary of Nazareth. In previous years, the Church of England allocated the feast of Michaelmas as a day for ordaining new deacons and priests to the sacred ministry.



30th: Jerome, Translator of the Scriptures Born I 342 in what is now Croatia, Jerome studied in Rome where he was baptised before trying out a vocation as a monk. He felt called to use his linguistic skills – he was fluent in Greek and Hebrew - to study the Scriptures more deeply. Thus began his life's work of translating the newly-canonised Bible into Latin. He eventually settled in Bethlehem, where he founded a monastery and where he died in 420AD

Mark Hodson, the Bishop of Hereford who ordained me way back in 1968 as well as being a very holy man, also had a great sense of humour. He often related this story about himself::

'Look what God has done to me! - I was a parish priest in the East End of London, a very poor area known as Poplar (this is where the TV series 'Call the Midwife was set)., my life was very much seeking to relate the Church to the poorest people living in such an area.

Now look! Here am I the Bishop of one of the most rural parts of England surrounded by green fields and farms - here the need is just as great - but in a different way'



I was made aware of Bishop Mark's story some time later! He came to the church where I was vicar to license a lay worker to relate to the poor people around the Church of All Saints. A beautiful ancient church in the heart of Hereford City. In spite of its surroundings it was very much one with people around it with very real and genuine needs.

Hence the need for a worker to relate to such people who we were attempting to help.

In the course of the service Bishop Mark referred to this story of his background and went on to tell the listeners that here was a parish priest (me!) who had a similar change - the other way round! Father Hugh, he said, had changed from a busy life in farming when God called him to a ministry here in the middle of a busy city!

I moved from the Parish of St George in Tuffley with our family to Spain to take up the Chaplaincy of Costa Almeria, with its three centres of worship. After a couple of years I was also appointed as Assistant Director of Ordinands. Shortly after this the Archdeacon of Gibraltar retired with ill health . I was asked by the Bishop to take on the duties of Archdeacon until a new person could be found.

Much to my relief it was soon announced that Revd David Sutch was to take over as Archdeacon as well as the Chaplaincy of Del Sol East. David too came from Gloucester and with our joint roles we soon became firm friends, and I became Area Dean which is really an assistant to the Archdeacon.

It should probably be pointed out to the Reader just what the Archdeaconry of Gibraltar comprised! As well as Gibraltar itself where the Cathedral is based, it covers Anglican Chaplaincies in Spain, Portugal, Madeira, Canary Islands, Balearic Islands and Morocco.

No small task even for the two of us!

The task before us was in a way similar to UK dioceses except of course the great distances involved and sometimes negotiations with other denominations and local authorities.

One of the real qualities of Archdeacon David as he then was, was his sense of humour - once asked what the advantage was of this job was, his response was "He was 3.000 mlles from the Bishop!"

Well, of course all good things come to an end and in 20l3 my family and I returned to Gloucester to this parish of St James in Quedgeley.

In 2017 David and his wife returned - also to Gloucester. Sadly Megan died and David remained in Brockworth and exercised a retirement ministry in that area.
