






News from the schools

Sarah – Princess and Mother of a Nation By Fr. Gordon

Sarah was the wife of Abraham and the matriarch of the tribes of Israel, she was their founding mother. Sarah and Abraham accompanied Terah, Abraham's father, when he set out from Ur of the Chaldees until they settled at Haran.

When a famine struck the land, they journeyed to Egypt to escape. The couple were uncertain of the treatment they would receive there – especially as Sarah was so beautiful and likely to attract men's attention.

So Abraham decided to pass Sarah off as his sister, not his wife. If they saw Abraham as her husband, they may try to kill him to get at Sarah. What Abraham feared, happened. Pharaoh had his soldiers took Sarah from her family, and placed her in his harem.

Egypt became afflicted with plague, When Pharaoh found out that Sarah was Abraham's wife, he viewed his nation's misfortune as punishment for his own sin. He restored Sarah to Abraham, and they returned home.

Sarah's life was blighted by the lack of a son. After many years in a loving marriage, she was still childless.

In desperation Sarah offered her slave girl Hagar to her husband Abraham; so that Hagar could bear him a son.

The plan back-fired: Hagar did indeed bear a son - Ishmael, and Hagar's status in the tribe rose. Poor, childless Sarah became even more despised.

God came to Sarah's rescue. He appeared to Abraham but, this time, in disguise. Three men approach the tent – were they angels? Or was it God? Abraham was sitting in the open front section of the tent. Sarah is in the back part, a private section for women and children separated from the front section by a heavy woven curtain.

Abraham greeted the men with the ritual hospitality of the East. They told Abraham that Sarah, despite her advanced age, would have a son. Abraham was perplexed, to say the least.

When they finished eating, they asked about Sarah. Where was she? Listening from behind the curtain, Sarah heard and laughed. It was absurd at her age.

God heard her, and asked Abraham, 'Why did Sarah laugh?' She was afraid and so she denied having laughed, but God contradicted her, saying, 'Yes, you did laugh! Is there anything that the Lord cannot do?'

She had a son, Isaac, whom she loved deeply. One day, after Isaac had been weaned, Sarah saw him playing with Ishmael, Abraham's son by Hagar, and she told Abraham to banish Hagar and Ishmael for she did not want him to have the same rights of inheritance as her own son, Isaac.

Before she died, there was one more event that Sarah has to deal with: Abraham's aborted sacrifice of her son Isaac. Sarah isn't mentioned in this incident, but she must surely have known about it. We don't know her side of the story we can only imagine how horrific it must have been for her.

Sarah died at Hebron in the land of Canaan when she was 127 years old. Because he was a foreigner, Abraham asked the inhabitants of Canaan - the Hittites - for a piece of land in which he could bury Sarah.



"Lights in their own generation"

Christian men & women who helped to build the Church throughout history - Fr. Ian Robb





2nd: The Martyrs of Papua & New Guinea: The Church in Papua New Guinea was enriched by martyrdom twice during the 20th century: in 1901 a group of English missionaries, and in 1941 two English priests, seven Australian & two Papuan evangelists all surrendered their lives for the sake of the gospel.

3rd: Gregory the Great: Pope from 590 – 604. It was his initiative that sent Augustine & his group of monks to re-establish the Church in England. Gregory styled himself as "Servant of the servants of God".

9th: Charles Lowder, priest: 1851 – the first vicar of St Peter London Docks. Dedicated to the poor and destitute, he epitomised the 19th century "slum priest".

15th: Cyprian, Bishop of Carthage, 248AD: He spoke out against the persecution of the Church in North Africa and defended those who turned to the Church after having been pagans. He was martyred in 258AD.

16th: Ninian, Bishop of Galloway: The son of a Christian Cumbrian chief, he studied in Rome before returning to Britain, where he set up a community in the English / Scottish borders. He travelled extensively through the borderlands and north to Perth and Sterling.

17th: Hildegard of Bingen, Abbess & teacher: She entered the abbey of Bingen and eventually established other convents in the Rhineland, teaching and writing in addition to leading her community.

21st: Matthew, Apostle & Evangelist: called by Jesus, he gave up his job as a tax-collector and affirmed that his life would now change and that he would make amends for any former wrongdoing. He is regarded as the eye-witness behind the gospel which bears his name.

25th: Lancelot Andrewes, **1555 – 1626**: Bishop of Chichester, then Ely, and finally Winchester. He was an Old Testament scholar and his translation of the Hebrew scriptures formed much the of the Old Testament in the "King James" (or "Authorised Version") of the Bible. He was buried in a church that was originally in the diocese of Winchester, but which is now the cathedral for the diocese of Southwark.

26th: Wilson Carlile, Founder of the Church Army: ordained in 1881, he served in the parish of St Mary Abbots Kensington, London. The lack of contact between the Church & the "working classes" was a cause of concern and he began outdoor preaching. In 1882 he founded the Church Army with a view to building up a unit for teaching & practical care in the community.

29th: Michael & All Angels: Michael, Gabriel, & Raphael are the three named biblical angels, depicted as the beloved messengers of God. Michael is best known as the slayer of the dragon in the Revelation to St John, and Gabriel as the bearer of good news to Mary of Nazareth. Raphael is the bearer of the healing word.

30th: Jerome, Translator of the Scriptures: Born in Croatia in 342, he studied in Rome and became proficient in Hebrew and Greek. He made it his life's work to translate the newly-published Bible into Latin. He eventually settled in Bethlehem, where he founded a monastery and continued his studies until his death in 420AD.

Who do you think you are? By Pat Wakely

In light of the violent riots that have occurred in this country, Pat Wakely explains her work with refugees and some of the benefits from being a multi-cultural society.

In August of 1972 the President of Uganda Idi Amin ordered the expulsion of its citizens from Bangladesh, India and Pakistan. I was working for an airline at the time at Gatwick Airport so was personally involved with escorting these passengers from their aircraft and through immigration. I witnessed at first hand their arrival, as they descended the aircraft steps looking bewildered, frightened and lost.

Our country has become a melting pot, absorbing nationalities from around the world. My own relatives arrived from Russia at the beginning of the 20th century to escape pogroms. Many settled in the East End of London, where along with the Irish refugees escaping the potato famine, communities lived side by side. It is due to the Jewish refugees traditional dish of fried fish and the Irish refugee's love of potatoes that we can enjoy fish and chips to this day. Indeed, there cannot be many people reading this article, who do not enjoy a good curry, a takeaway Chinese or foods from all around the world. How have we been introduced to all these different cuisines? I would suggest partly through foreign travel but mainly through immigration.

As I write, protests are taking place up and down our country regarding immigration. I am sure there may

be people who read this article who do not agree with me, and I respect this. I can only speak from my own experience. I have been fortunate to travel widely and continue to be blessed by my friendships and experience of people from around the world. This tells me that most people want the same. We worry about our loved ones, we want what is best for our children, we need a roof over our heads and hope for good health. The colour of our skin makes absolutely no difference as to how we love.



My community has been working alongside refugees in Gloucester who have come from countries around the world. Everyone, many of whom have valuable skills to offer, want to work and contribute to the country that has given them a home. They like the people expelled from Uganda, are aspirational and hard working.

Whether we pray to God, Allah or just want to hold special thoughts, let us hope that this terrible time of unrest will come to an end soon.

Next Steps





We promised to try to keep everybody in the loop as regards the next steps to re-ordering the Church ready for the next generations to come. Regular updates in the 'Spire' magazine is one way we can try to meet that promise. We do not want anyone to feel they have been left out or unsure of plans or progress.

We have been pleased to have feedback from several people and will be responding as soon as we can.

In the meantime, work in the background has continued slowly but surely. The first thing is that we will soon be asking our contractor to start work on removing those dangerous wooden cusps on the south porch door frame. The Victorians who designed and built it were a good deal shorter than we are today, and if you have bumped into one, you know how very painful it is. The approvals are imminent. This work will also include re-plastering the hole in the inside roof, and replacing broken floor tiles, although they will not at this stage be polished; that won't happen until they match the interior ones.

Work has progressed on some of the repair work identified in the Quinquennial report which forms part of the overall re-ordering.

We have had discussions with the architects about the detail and layout of the information they need in order that they can then produce the three options for our consideration. The details that we are providing are based on the ideas that came from the various church family meetings and discussions, and subsequently agreed by the PCC.

Work is also ongoing in the matter of applications for grants and also time-line planning to ensure that our financial needs are met as required in a timely fashion throughout the project.

It will be a long and challenging task but as Paul says in Romans 'If God is with us, who can stand against us?' So we ask for your continued prayers for wisdom, direction, strength, patience and when needed courage, so that when we are finished, we shall have completed Gods task the way he plans it, and not allowed our personal ideas to cloud our vision of that.

QUEDGELEY WOMENS' INSTITUTE

At our July meeting we heard about the cancer charity Charlies that Jo Stanford had started after being diagnosed with cancer and finding that there was no support for anyone going through cancer at that time. The charity officially opened in March 2014 and what started with a handful of volunteers has now grown to 65 and offers holistic therapies including Reflexology, Reiki INSPIRING WOMEN and Mindfulness among many other things and the surprising thing is that they are all free of charge! The charity is based in Gloucester but also holds

sessions in the Forest of Dean, Cheltenham, Newent, Cirencester and Stroud. If we had never heard of Charlies we do now and anyone who needs their services is going to be made very welcome.

With another reference to charity we heard from Victoria Ranford from the Community Pantry which was set up by Quedgeley Town Council. It is not a food bank and is not means tested so anyone who is in need of help can sign up for £3 a week and can choose ten items that have been donated at collection points in the area.

There will be no normal meeting in August as we are looking forward to our annual outing to Stratford upon Avon with afternoon tea and a boat trip. Our meeting will be back to normal in September when we will be hearing about Coloured Gemstones and anyone who would like to come along as a visitor or new member will be made very welcome.

Welcome to our September update. We hope you have all enjoyed the Summer, we have indeed enjoyed some good weather at last!

First of all we would like to welcome David Goddard onto the council. David joined in August and brings with him a wealth of experience and knowledge which we know will benefit the council hugely. David is still learning about his new role as a councillor but is already eager to serve his community. Details of all our councillors can be found on our website or in our office window.



The other good news we are proud to share is being rewarded Quality Gold Status under the Local Council Award Scheme. This is the highest award a local council can receive and is a measure of how professional, visible and amendable the council is to its community. The high standards for this award must be sustained for 4 years, after which a vigorous and thorough investigation of the council takes place, together with an evidenced based assignment made up of 56 questions over a 38 page document which takes approximately 6 months to complete. We hope this award shows our

residents how much importance we attach to good customer service and being accountable to the public.

We thought we would take a moment to provide you all with an update on the Quedgeley Social Club building. Quedgeley Social Club ceased trading on the 31st July 2024. The club had been struggling for



a few years and certainly post Covid times and despite numerous rent holidays, rent reductions and repayment plans offered by this council, the footfall for the club simply was not enough to keep it solvent. This council shares everyone's disappointment in the closing of this club and recognises that for some is was a lifeline. With this in mind, this council is committed to ensuring that whatever this premises is used for, it will be for the community. Several expressions of interest have already been received and the council are being careful in making the right decision for everyone which is why this

takes time. We want to get it 'right first time' so thank you to everyone for being patient, bear with us and we will keep you as up to date with the process as we can.

As we move into September, so we see schools returning and we urge everyone to be mindful of their



parking and driving around the schools. This subject always causes the most complaints. All we ask is that if you are driving or dropping off at schools be mindful of others and be mindful of the children.

On the subject of parking, have you seen the new notices at The Local Centre, Kingsway? Many local residents are being caught out so we urge you all to be careful when parking there. The Local Centre parking does not include the Kingsway Community Centre. Parking for the Community Centre is directly outside the centre. We are actively trying to resolve this matter however until such time as these parking restrictions change, we urge everyone to remain mindful of where they are parking when visiting that area.
